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IMPACT OF PRINTED MODULAR LEARNING TO PARENTS, STUDENTS, AND TEACHERS

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As DepEd secretary Leonor Briones quoted, "education cannot wait". In regard to this, the Department of Education prepared different learning modalities to ensure the delivery of quality education in these times of pandemic.

To continue the education of millions of Filipino students, the government implemented a distance learning approach in which distance learning, also known as home study or home schooling, is a form of education where there is no face-to-face interaction between students and their teachers.

Most parents prefer to choose Printed Modular learning due to lack of internet connection and gadgets as well.
