These requirements already apply to any or all new hires. Schools are required to inform parents about the qualifications of all teachers, and that they must notify parents if their child is taught for quite four weeks by a tutor who isn't highly qualified. Schools that don't comply risk losing federal funding.

Although the law required states to own highly qualified teachers in every core academic classroom by the tip of the 2005-2006 year, not one state met that deadline.
