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INCREASING TIME-ON-TASK AND PUPILS' ENGAGEMENT

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Time-on-task refers to the quantity of ages students spend about to school-related tasks (Prater, 2002), like following directions and being fascinated in learning activities. Time-on-task isn't a current teaching strategy or learning activity. While there's some relationship between time-on-task (or engaged time) and student achievement, simply increasing the number of sometime available for instruction isn't enough to realize learning gains.

Time allocated for instruction must be appropriate; that's, at the acceptable instructional level for varsity kids and delivered during a very way that's effective, efficient, meaningful, and motivating to students. It is important to remain in mind that the bulk of studies have measured time, and only a tiny- low number of studies have attempted to measure engaged time which is the time where students participate in learning activities and academic learning time which is the time when true learning occurs (Aronson, Zimmerman, & Carlos, 2008).

Time on task' isn't a singular teaching strategy or learning activity. It's an observation technique that measures the common measure students are observed to be engaged in learning during a lesson. this might be often an awfully important aspect of the teaching and learning process because, not surprisingly, it has been demonstrated that increased time spent on learning activities finally ends up in increased learning.
