

TRANSITION TO LEARNING MODALITIES: A CHALLENGE TO LEARNERS

The World Health Organization (WHO) declared the spread of the Corona virus worldwide on March 11, 2020. It was a huge challenge for the country to deal with the series of changes that occurred during the peak of COVID-19. Education was one of the areas greatly affected by this global pandemic. In the Philippines, students were forced to be on a long vacation as the Department of Education was still deciding on what learning modality would be administered in schools while seeking solutions for the rapid spread of the deadly disease.

On October 5, 2020, as approved by former President Rodrigo Duterte when the opening of the class for the school year 2020–2021 was announced and distance learning was applied.
