Additionally, it helps to augment student behavior in the classroom. Students feel more motivated in their classes when parents and teachers communicate more; as a result, their attitudes and self-esteem in the classroom increase.

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Furthermore, all ages can profit from the benefit. There are other studies that concentrated on high school students, even though the advantages are typically addressed in the context of preschool or elementary school pupils. Despite its influence waning as the kid gets older, parental participation is something that matters at all educational levels. Even so, in high school, having the parents involved can influence the student's decision to continue studying or not.

Parental participation also enhances teacher performance. Better parent-teacher communication helps parents realize the effort and difficulties teachers endure, which in turn helps teachers feel valued. It also helps teachers learn more about the students, which enables them to deliver more individualized and effective instruction.

Parents that have a good working connection with the school are better able to understand the curriculum and how their children are developing.
