While reading the text, students give answers and respond to questions to clarify or check mastery. This assists them in maintaining meaning while reading and identifying potential problems within the reading material. Students may struggle to understand ambiguous statements or passages, and this strategy allows students to evaluate these in groups.

Questioning encourages students to think critically and provides a chance to raise questions throughout the reading process. They evaluate what they read and draw conclusions. They respond to questions based on the assimilation of prior and present knowledge to present their positions. They identify supporting details, which is an important part of the reciprocal teaching process. Students are expected to frequently ask questions during conversations, which enables them to have a deeper understanding.

Predicting is the process by which students evaluate what they believe they will understand. They use headings, titles, images, graphs, and illustrations to stimulate prior knowledge. They make a prediction and look for textual clues to foresee what might happen. They draw conclusions based on what they believe they have read.

Students take on the role of the teacher and participate in active tasks during the learning process. The teacher employs high-impact reading strategies, and students work in small groups to fulfill their responsibilities. The teacher provides the students with group tasks where students have to perform a certain role. As a student performs the assigned role, all members are expected to benefit from a good outcome. Students are involved because they perform a specific function needed to complete the task.

Students observe and evaluate their understanding. They are responsible for and manage their groups. This motivates the students and engages them all, resulting in improved reading learning and retention. According to research, reciprocal teaching enhances students' comprehension skills and helps them maintain those skills because it
