What's most important is that you keep going and try not to be absent so that they can have the perspective that going to school every day really matters, and that's already a lesson that we shared with them about the importance of education.

Trying to be composed, whatever the situation may be, can be your greatest advantage. Go to school prepared and inspired, and you will not be worried. Loving our chosen profession means loving ourselves; first and foremost, it is our bread and butter. If you keep on loving it, it means you love yourself, and you will learn to love children always. Keeping you inspired in the profession and targeting a goal for the learners is the greatest gift that will fuel you to keep going, always leading to positive discipleship in your class.
