In 2003, an initiative called Brigada Eskwela (or School Brigade) was formed. It is also known as National School Maintenance Week. As a result of the program's success, it was required for all schools in the country to adopt it several weeks before the 2008 school year (Meridie, 2021).

Brigada Eskwela Partnership Initiatives seeks, among other things, to increase financial support for educational institutions. Donations to schools can come from hard currency and nonmonetary resources like supplies and time from dedicated volunteers. Donated funds can be utilized to provide classrooms with the necessary materials. Donations in kind can take the form of anything from textbooks to computers to lab equipment. Carpenters, electricians, and painters are just a few examples of skilled workers whose time and expertise can be donated to schools through volunteer services.

Schools have benefited from the efforts of the Brigada Eskwela Partnership Initiatives. Thanks to these investments, students can access better facilities, and classrooms are equipped with more modern tools.
