## **BUILDING RELATIONSHIP WITH STUDENT**

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Relationships have always been integral to teaching-learning process. However, building relationship ls in schools is becoming non-negotiable -- some schools must embrace to ensure the success of learning. Those includes: increased learning and desire to achieve high standard; Decreased negative behavior incidents and dropout rates; Increased school satisfaction and motivation; Increased sense of student self-efficiency; Improved positive attitudes toward learning; andImproved students' socio-emotional skills, such as being caring, having empathy, and social responsibility.

The quality of relationships teachers has with their students is the key to an effective classroom management and perhaps even to the entirety of teaching. A teacher's knowledge is crucial in improving students' achievement of learning, teachers must first see the student as individual and what he can bring to the table in terms of interest, skills, strengths, and area for growth. Building relationship begins with the simple things that matter to students the most, smiling at them, using their names, praising them, knowing who they are and what they like, allowing them to explore, most importantly, being consistent to all these things.

Teachers like to think of it as treating all students like they would want their children to be treated as Johnny Dewey once said "what the teachers and wisest parents want for their children should be what we want for all the children."

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
