Grubbs & Boes revealed that teachers and students surveyed regarding the peer tutoring program believed it is effective as implemented. Although proven effective, they concluded that more training for the tutors is needed to make the program more effective.

Giving one-on-one or small group discussions in middle school for students with problems with basic reading skills can be challenging for a teacher. Time is limited for teachers to cover the curriculum and manage student behaviors, and time for providing remedial instruction is also minimal. As students with hardships in reading go through their academic years, they find it more difficult to absorb information from materials beyond their ability. Thus, all students must be eligible for instruction to help them read effectively. A reliable tutor must do such instruction. With the help of a competent tutor, teacher dominance might be lessened, and low-performing students in reading could have more ease in learning and developing their reading comprehension. This can materialize with the participation of teachers and selected excellent readers within a school community.
