ESTABLISHING RAPPORT BETWEEN TEACHERS AND STUDENTS

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The rapport that exists between students and teachers is a natural bond that develops over time with shared interests. This relationship develops over time as the teacher learns more about the students and vice versa, strengthening bonds between them and promoting harmony and trust in the classroom.

There are many methods to developing rapport in the classroom. Getting to know your students better is one of them. A genuine rapport is established when students are at ease and comfortable engaging in conversation with you both within the classroom and in the hallways. Students start to trust you when they feel at ease around you. The teacher-student relationship is based on trust; the students must believe that the teacher has their best



interests at heart and wants them to succeed. Once rapport has been formed, trust can develop.

It takes more than just being able to talk freely in class to build rapport. Students are more motivated when they feel that their teacher is interested in them and understands them. An important component of their academic success is an increase in motivation in the classroom.
