Thirdly, students are opposed to utilizing and promoting their mother language because they believe it is low-class (Songcayawon, 2014). Dharyl Bucad, an SST-I from a public high school, agrees with Francisco. Bucad agrees that Filipino subject teachers face many of the same challenges that Francisco did. (Bucad, 2016)
