RECOMMENDED PROGRAMS, PROJECTS, AND ACTIVITIES OF THE **LEARNER GOVERNMENT PROGRAMS FOR SCHOOL YEAR 2024-2025**

To: Assistant Schools Division Superintendent Chief Education Supervisors **Education Program Supervisors Public Schools District Supervisors** Public and Private Elementary and Secondary School Heads Teacher-Advisers of Clubs/Organizations Student Leaders

- 1. Pursuant to OUOPS No. 2023-03 titled "Interim Guidelines of the Learner Government Program (LGP) for the School Year 2023-2024", this Office issues the Recommended Programs, Projects, and Activities (PPAs) of the Learner Government Program for School Year 2024-2025.
- 2. These PPA's aim to protect the health, safety, and well-being of learners by establishing learner support systems that shall facilitate the provision of psychosocial support, health and safety measures, and remediation and enhancement to all types of learners. These shall be realized through the leadership or assistance of the SSLG and SELG in the implementation of the following activities:

- For the purpose of this Memorandum, the following terms are defined for reference:
 - Lead refers to the PPAs that shall be organized and conducted at all school levels by the SSLG and SELG to ensure the participation of the learners, and
 - b. Assist refers to the activities that shall be implemented at the school level with the support of the SSLG and SELG through physical or virtual participation.
- 4. The SELG and SSLG shall adopt applicable approaches to ensure continuous delivery of the PPAs in consideration of the provisions of DepEd Order No. 9, s. 2005, titled "Instituting Measures to Increase Engaged Time-On-Task and Ensuring Compliance Therewith", to wit:
 - a. SSLG and SELG programs, projects, and activities (PPAs) that involve the gathering of a large number of learners, such as student leadership and psychological first aid training and other similar activities, shall be implemented through face-to-face however a limited number of participants are allowed;
 - Only PPAs intended to support or increase learners' mental resilience may be conducted by SSLG officers aged 15 and above through a limited face-to-face modality, in proper coordination with and guidance of the concerned school teaching and non-teaching personnel;
 - c. SELG and SSLG are highly encouraged to create offline (e.g., hotlines) and online channels (e.g., Viber, Facebook, Messenger, Zoom, and Teams) to facilitate communication between SELG and SSLG officers, advisers, and Learner Formators; provided the Data Privacy Act is strictly followed;
 - d. SELG and SSLG shall ensure the observance of ethical standards and data privacy of students during the delivery of the mandated PPAs;
 - e. SELG and SSLG shall submit an Annual Accomplishment Report duly endorsed by the school head to the PDO I/Learner Formation Coordinator using the prescribed template; and
 - f. SELG and SSLG shall submit the consolidated list of the approved and recognized learner clubs and organizations using the prescribed template.



















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- 5. The following organizational support mechanisms shall be provided by DepEd at all levels to ensure that the abovementioned PPAs are implemented:
 - a. PPAs must be funded under Learner Support Fund (MOOE and Local Funds), School and Annual Improvement Plans, subject to the usual accounting and auditing rules and regulations;
 - Adoption of the revised Constitution By-laws of the SELG and SSLG;
 - Conduct of the synchronized SELG and SSLG elections and requisite turnover of responsibilities, financial statements, and other records and properties to the succeeding set of officers;
 - Implementation of the synchronized elections of all other school-based learner organizations;
 - Establishment of Federation of SELGs and SSLGs in the district, and division as ready mechanisms for learner consultations and as sources of feedback and policy recommendations on issues and concerns that affect them;
 - f. Organization of the District, and Division Associations of SELGs and SSLGs as support groups for the implementation and monitoring of SELG and SSLG;
 - g. Conduct of student leadership training for the Learner Government Program and school-based learner organizations at the school, district, and division, provided it is per existing DepEd policies;
 - Conduct of webinars and workshops on the basic provision of psychosocial first aid (PFA) for Learner Government and school-based learner organizations to act as peer support groups and youth advocates; and
 - Conduct of recognition and awards programs and activities for outstanding SELG and SSLG organizations, officers, and advisers through activities led by district, division, regional, and national offices of DepEd.
 - 6. School Heads are tasked to ensure the smooth implementation of the Learner Government Program by appropriating funds. The Division Learner Formation Coordinators and the Schools Governance and Operations Division are required to monitor the compliance of the SELG and SSLG. The Learner Formation Section shall actively coordinate with the Office on implementing the Learner Government Programs.




