This kind of motivation is connected to how students feel about their autonomy, their sense of competence, and their relationships with others. Also, creating a supportive and positive learning environment that encourages students' intrinsic motivation is crucial for their success in school. As teachers, we can help foster this kind of motivation by being understanding and patient with our students, and by finding ways to make learning fun and engaging for everyone in the classroom.

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experiences that are meaningful and relevant to them, letting them have more control over their own learning, and creating a classroom environment where they feel supported and work well together. Locke and Latham (2002) say that setting clear, challenging goals can really boost motivation and help students stay focused on what they want to achieve. Then, by checking in with them regularly and offering support along the way, teachers can keep the motivation going and help students succeed.
