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BOOSTING THE TEACHING PROFESSION

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Things that are simple to teach and test are now also simple to digitize and automate in our modern environment. Moving school systems is extremely difficult because of the considerably greater unseen portion beneath the waterline. The views, abilities, motives, and anxieties of those working in education are the subject of this invisible component.
