Younger students improve their oral reading fluency, vocabulary, and comprehension, while older students develop leadership, responsibility, and empathy. Some studies reported significant improvement in reading performance among lower-grade students who participated in a peer reading program. Older students also became more confident and engaged in their roles as mentors.

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To implement this approach effectively, schools must provide training and guidance to peer mentors. Teachers should model how to give feedback, assist with pronunciation, ask comprehension questions, and encourage positive behavior. Scheduling regular sessions and matching pairs thoughtfully are key to success. Though challenges such as inconsistent attendance or mismatched pairs may occur, these can be addressed through teacher supervision and proper planning.

Using higher-grade students to support the reading development of younger learners is a practical and impactful approach. It not only improves reading skills but also strengthens relationships, encourages collaboration, and builds a supportive learning environment. With structured planning and teacher guidance, peer-assisted reading can become a sustainable component of a school's literacy program, fostering both academic growth and character development among students.
