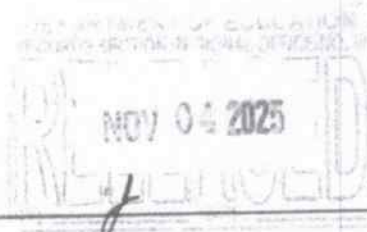

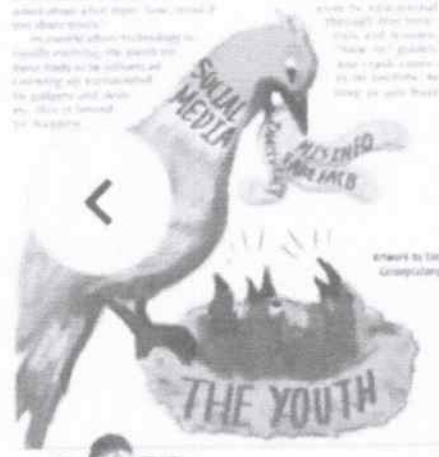

Campus journalist weighs in on AI's double-edged role in truth and deception

AI, or a lie?

With the rapid rise of artificial intelligence (AI), now capable of generating realistic videos, we must ask ourselves: are we embracing a revolutionary breakthrough, or have we just unlocked a powerful new channel for the spread of fake news?

AI is no longer a futuristic concept—it's here, woven into our daily routines. From drafting essays to generating images and automating paperwork, AI has become a convenient tool for many Filipinos. It's undeniable: AI makes life easier. But as with any powerful tool, there are downsides, especially when it's used to mislead, manipulate, or misinform.

Take, for instance, the AI-generated video involving the impeachment of the Vice President. In the video, "AI students" were shown responding to the issue. But if the goal was to gather genuine youth opinion, why rely on computer-generated personas? Why not amplify real voices?

The truth is, every AI-generated output is based on prompts and commands from a human operator. It reflects the intent, bias, and perspective of its creator. And when such content is framed as public opinion, it risks becoming a sophisticated form of disinformation.

'Truth and trend

The digital war for the youth's opinion

Digital footprints are now louder than dove protests. Social media has become the battleground of thoughts, opinions, and ideologies, especially among the youth. Platforms like Facebook, Twitter, X, and Instagram have grown into spaces where conversations unfold, sometimes even faster than traditional news can catch up. But this acceleration is a challenge: How do we ensure that what shapes our youth is rooted in truth — and not just in trends?

Social media has empowered the voice of the youth like never before. It has enabled them to engage in social issues, speak out against injustice, and influence conversations that once seemed beyond their reach. With just a click, they can create movements, organize protests, or advocate for change. This digital empowerment is vital, but so is the need for engagement in authentic and meaningful ways.

In this digital age, however, the spread of misinformation, disinformation, and fake news remains a

growing and glaring threat. Opinions are often forged not solely through facts, but also through edited content, misleading headlines, and viral posts designed to provoke emotions rather than encourage understanding. It becomes increasingly difficult to distinguish verified knowledge from manipulated news stories.

In this digital war, campus journalists are among the most affected. They must struggle to distinguish credible information from falsehoods. They need the sources they use until they realize they have unknowingly become messengers of misinformation. While these campus journalists are expected to be the watchdogs in their respective schools, they are bombarded with so much unfettered content that separating fact from fiction becomes a challenge.

Therefore, campus journalists must be equipped with the tools to verify news, fact-check claims, and report on the situation. But they can't do this alone. For example, school paper advisers (SPAs) are not only mentors in truth, but also the frontline defenders of youth, tasked with guiding the youth to become vanguards

of ethical journalism and responsible digital citizenship. The SPAs are responsible for mentoring a generation that can resist misinformation and the false digital manipulation.

When emotions are manipulated and sensationalism is left unchecked, critical thinking may never truly take root. Algorithms — systems that rank user-provided signals to determine what type of content to display — often trap users within echo chambers,

expanding their only opinions that reinforce what they already believe. This current perspective threatens healthy discourse.

'Campus journalism can boost interest in science'

SOME 263 campus journalists and school paper advisers from across the country can help "improve public understanding and appreciation of the value of science in everyday life," Science Communicators Philippines Inc. (SciCommPh) head Ruby Roan-Cristobal said during the 21st Word Cup National Campus Journalism Press Conference and Contests.

Roan-Cristobal, creative lecturer at the University of the Philippines (UP) Diliman College of Development Communications, said the need for science and those in the applied sciences to grant more publicity while challenging campus journalists to write in "sympathetic" or happy voices in the field.

"Science communication and resources help science policymakers and provide sound basis for decision-making," she said.

The Word Cup, held at Angeli Hall in Taguig City on May 4 and 5, closed the theme, "The Role of

Science in Society in Advancing A Sustainable Future: Promoting Science in Society, Action and (S)ocial Action of Science and Society."

Roan-Cristobal also lauded the faculty media programs, "Radio Science" on DZRH and "Live Science" on DZMM, and has been the chair sponsor research specialist at the Department of Science and Technology (DOST) for all years.

She said, "NGOs are more vocal" when raising awareness who promote actual knowledge through research articles out of the pocket.

Roan-Cristobal will work cooperatively with Paguigan, who

manages the Philippines' first science-related radio station, during the conference.

Paguigan, executive director of the Philippine Association for Science and Technology, who serves as Roan-Cristobal's mentor, said he is excited to help promote science in the field, which is not just good public officials to lead science education.

He advised that public and private universities in science education remain key.

While Science Center, a private research and training organization, has served over a hundred thousand students over the years, the program remains in some places to attract 24 students to its courses.

Paguigan said a local-level involvement of school PTI leaders is needed to create a regional science network. The organization currently has eight regional hubs in partnership with local governments.

Paguigan, College supervisor of the 21st Word Cup, said the event featured two of the country's experts "in a very rare way" as evidenced by the Department of Education (DepEd) in promoting science and earth education in view of the 2023 Program for International Student Assessment (PISA) ranking of 13-year-old students in the country.
