This is also the opportunity to teach students to listen to the voices that do not get to speak, and to realize how special every person's story is.

Encourages Respect and Tolerance, when students read about culture which is different from their own, they can develop a sense of respect for diversity and an appreciation for multiplicity. Ultimately, this value promotes tolerance not only in what they read, but also in how they interact with their real-world context.
